



Membership Application Form

A signed copy of this sheet needs to be kept on record before anyone can be given a new account. Users who have not signed it (due to legacy reasons) are still accountable to the rules and regulations set here.

The UCLA Linux Users Group provides you with a computer account and network access to support your education and research into the Linux operating system. We expect you to behave responsibly with this account. Misuses could result in the loss of your account. This document is the result of a blending of the CS departments acceptable use policy, and the UCLA LUG's past experiences with "problem users".

1. You must follow the guidelines established by UCLA for all computer accounts, in addition to those guidelines specifically mentioned here.
2. Do not break any US or California laws in the use of your account.
3. Do not use your account to break into any other account, either in the CS department or anywhere else. Do not use your account to probe other systems for vulnerabilities, nor to interfere with other people's use of computers or networks, nor to eavesdrop on network traffic, nor to create and disseminate malicious code that causes trouble to others. This includes:
 - a. nmap
 - b. Proxies/VPNs of any kind. The UCLA LUG would normally be happy to host them but they've been outlawed by the CS department.
4. You may not use your account to support any business or other commercial activity, or for personal gain. This includes public web pages. Absolutely no crypto miners!
5. Be courteous and sensible in your interactions with others while using the machine. Also remember that the LUG resources are shared and should not be misused. This includes the following:
 - a. Keep the disk usage to a minimum.
 - b. If you need to run a daemon or background a process, that's fine. **MAKE CERTAIN** however that nothing you do takes up an inordinate amount of CPU. Accounts whose processes start slowing down the machines for other people will be removed.
 - c. Just as you should not use excessive CPU, excessive bandwidth usage is prohibited. Keep it reasonable. The CS Department regularly monitors bandwidth usage.
6. The UCLALUG will make every reasonable effort to provide you with privacy and security for this account. You in turn must behave sensibly with regards to security. Choose a good password, do not share it with anyone else, do not allow others to use your account, and use reasonable care in installing and running software. If there are security problems with your account, you are expected to cooperate with the UCLALUG in solving them, and to take any steps that they require. In extreme circumstances, security problems may require the UCLALUG to temporarily disable your account with little or no notice. We will absolutely avoid such actions whenever possible. **Please use a strong password!**
7. UCLA LUG will host web pages for you as well as provide you with some anonymous FTP space. Remember that anything you post reflects on both you and us, and use this service responsibly. Aside from the commercial gain clause in #4, this also includes:
 - a. Absolutely NO pornography of any type is allowed.
 - b. No warez, mp3s, or otherwise illegal/pirated content is allowed.
 - i. When the FBI finds your illegal content it'll be us who gets in trouble, so we take these things very seriously. **Do not do anything illegal!**

8. Unsolicited e-mail (SPAM) of ANY KIND is expressly prohibited. This is absolutely NOT tolerated and will result in the permanent and immediate removal of your account.

9. Accounts must stay active. Inactive accounts are a security risk, and will be deleted. 'Inactive' is defined as 'You haven't logged in for 3 months'. So in order to keep your account active, you must log in at least once every three months. This applies even if you're forwarding your mail. The UCLALUG is not a mail forwarding service.

10. If you have *any* questions about this, or if you have any technical requests (like if you need a port opened), please send an e-mail to the UCLALUG Officers at board@linux.ucla.edu. This document can be found on the website at linux.ucla.edu/application.pdf at any time.

11. Generally, use common sense and don't do anything to others that you wouldn't want done to you. Also, don't do anything that you think might get us in trouble.
